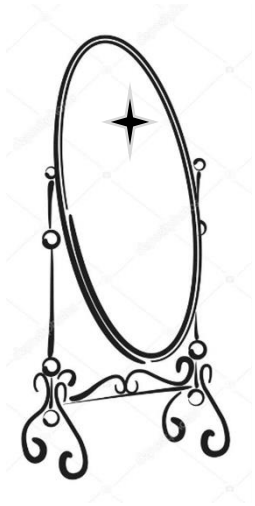

A few more days passed and the emperor sent in his high council to check on the fabric. All three men walked up to the men working their looms and couldn't see a thing.

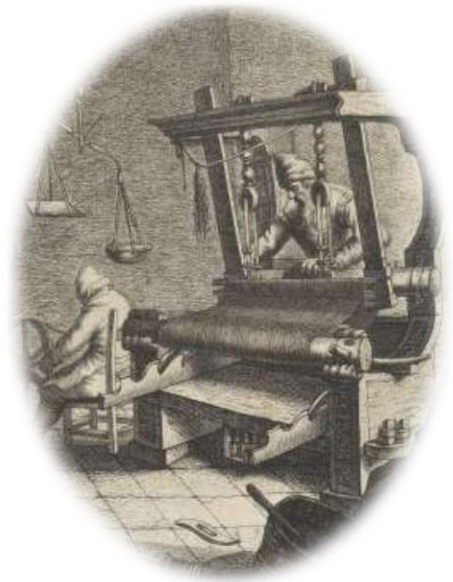
"What do you think, sirs?" one of the men said. "Isn't it turning out marvelous?"

“One of a kind.”

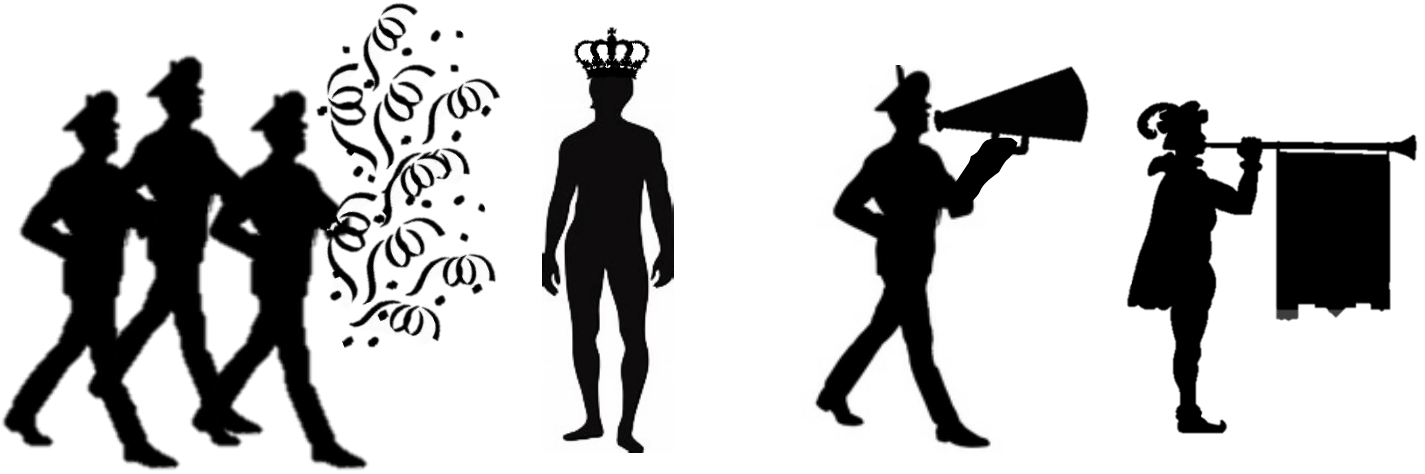
The emperor smiled. He did not want them all to think he could not see the suit. They would think him unworthy to rule.

The emperor’s face grew red, for he knew the boy and his father spoke the truth. He was indeed naked. The two men had cheated him and tricked him.

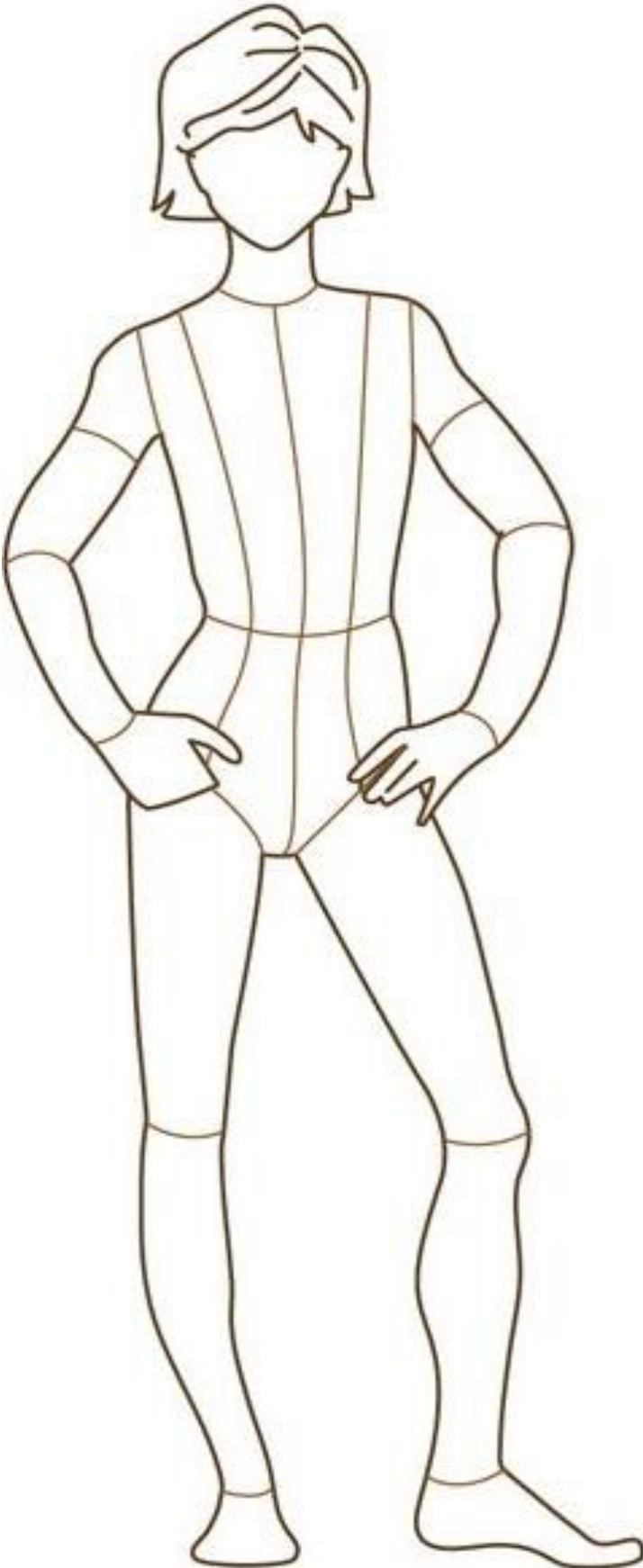
But he still didn’t want to look foolish in front of his people. So, the emperor held his head high and finished the parade.
